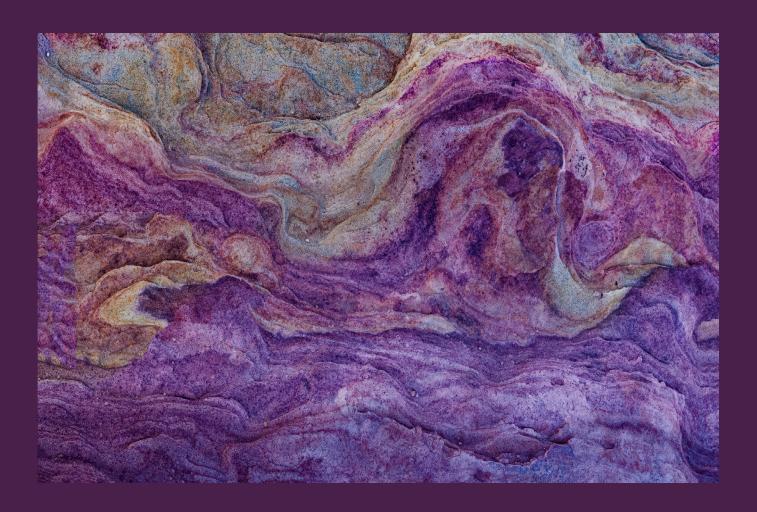

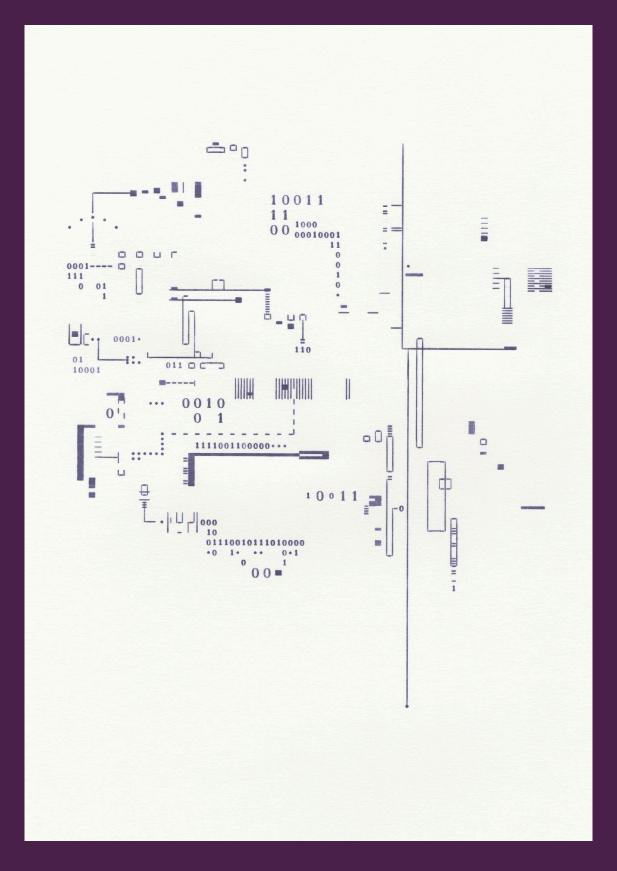

PURPLE IS THE GREATEST COLOR.

Welcome to Issue 005 of Monochromica, where we feature the color PURPLE. As I said in the headline, I believe purple is the greatest color. Of course, that's a personal opinion... but I feel strongly that I'm correct.

Until relatively recently, purple was one of the most expensive pigments to produce. Tyrian purple dye, a biological pigment, was produced by extracting a secretion from the murex rock snail. It required tens of thousands of snails and substantial labor, causing it to be available only the richest of the rich.

Hence, purple's assocation with royalty, wealth, and spiritual authority.

Purple is both warm and cool, mysterious yet elegant, and emotionally complex. It balances compositions, combining the calm stability of blue with the energy of red, evoking introspection and symbolism

There is a psychological weight carried by the color purple, making it useful for art meant to convey transformation, imagination, and the unseen. Individuality and creative freedom are modern connotations of purple.

On top of all this, purple seems to be the color with the most shades. You can practically make an entire spectrum just from the shades of purple, ranging from the reddest of purples through the bluest, the brightest to darkest, the lightest to the heaviest of saturation.



I believe purple is the greatest color. That's why it's also my favorite color. It took a long time to settle on the shade of purple for this issue. We settled on Russian Purple, with the CMYK values 35, 70, 0, 70.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

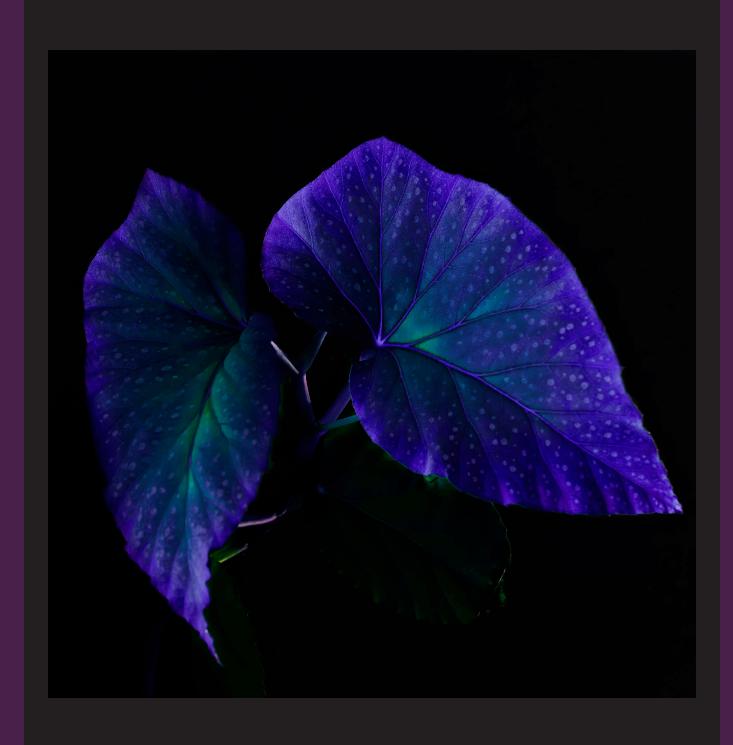

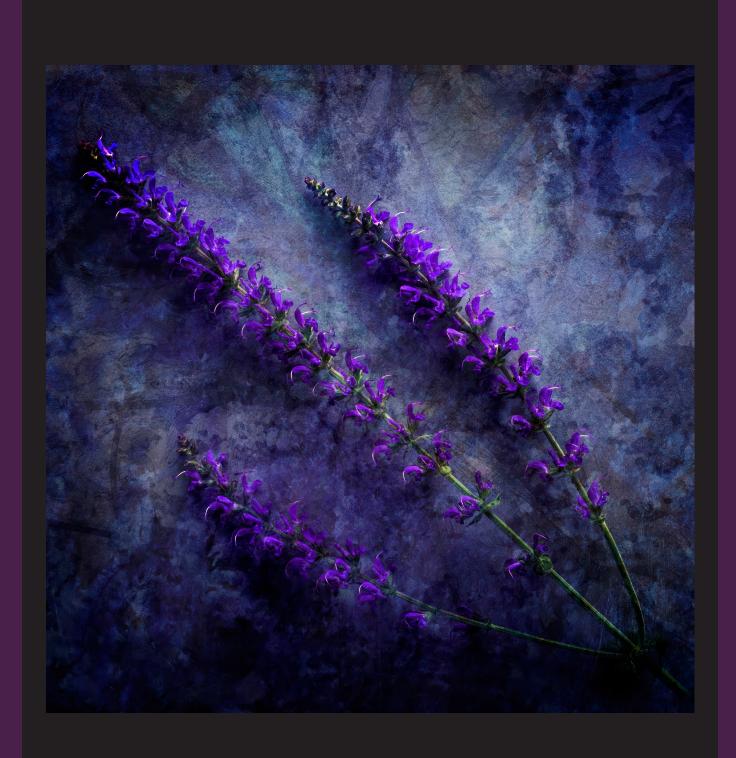

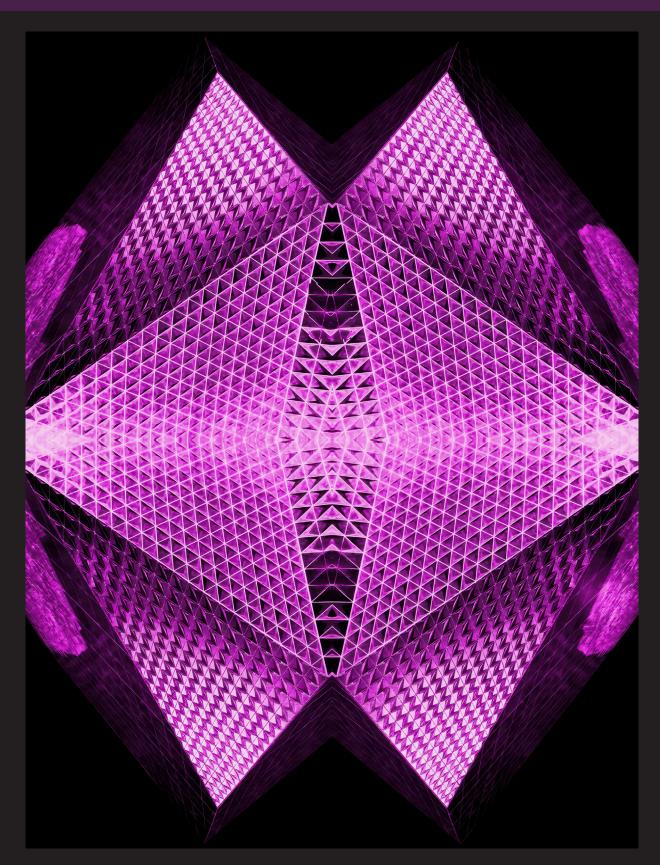
"Perfume Bottle" Digital Photograph, 10in x 8in x 0.1in, 2024, NFS

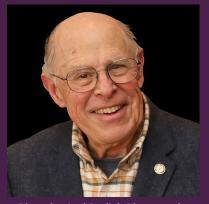

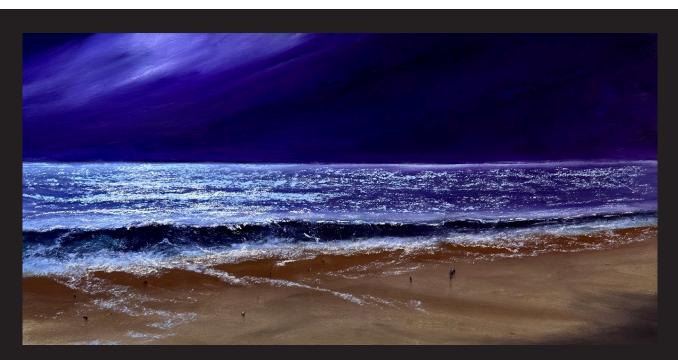
ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My artwork has taken twists and turns through the 5 decades I have been painting. In the past, spontaneous watercolors have been overtaken by sharp focus airbrush work; then usurped by brushwork acrylics and now settled into

soft pastels. Pastels have revealed another side of my creative drive, and they were not easily coaxed into revealing their secret as to how to really use them. Although pastels appear as a stick of chalk, a pastel is really a chunk of pigment that you hold in your hand rather than on the tip of brush bristles. The colors can be quite intense, or rather calm as described in everyday vocabulary when we say a color of a sofa or wall paint is "pastel". I have found that pastels are anything but calm and peaceful. What I like about pastels is the immediacy of getting on to the work surface the idea I have in my head. The first dash is sometimes right and more often, not. And here is where pastels are different than other mediums. It is not easy to just overpaint something that didn't come out right. Pastels make you pay a price for the errant stroke of color; the choice of the wrong hue; the filling in of too much tooth on the surface and the whole color theme to begin with. Pastels demand that you start with a plan and stick to it in a freewheeling way. I prefer to take as much control of my painting procedure as I can and that includes preparing my own painting surface. I do not use paper but rather hardboard panels that must be sanded, primed, gessoed, sanded again and then finally prepped with a fine acrylic pastel ground. This takes time but it gives me a durable surface that allows me to manipulate the pastels without fear of damaging the surface. It is strictly a personal choice.

BIOGRAPHY

Leanne Trivett S. is an award winning photographer and visual artist using her personal photographs to explore experimental self portraiture, florals, and the emotional abstract. She graduated with a BFA in Theatre from Tisch School of the Arts at New York University in NY, NY. Her background in musical theatre and her experience performing as a professional singer have inspired her creation of characters and self expression through images and photography. She is best known for her colorful and current self portraits and her work with florals. Her work has been exhibited, published, and awarded nationally and internationally in venues and magazines worldwide. She spends her free time traveling, teaching, giving art talks, and creating in her artist studio near Asheville, NC. All of her imagery comes from photos she takes with her cameras.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

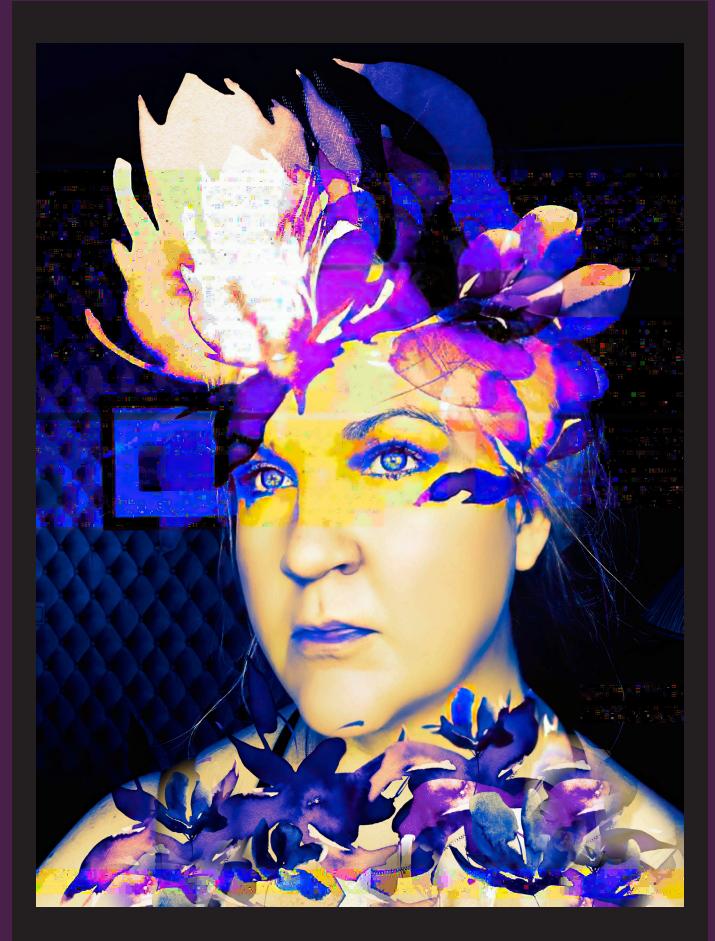
I am a visual artist and photographer who speaks through the lens - using photography as a vessel for self-inquiry, emotional resonance, and lyrical storytelling. My work moves between self-portraiture, experimental florals, abstraction and emotion - where identity is not fixed, but layered, abstracted, and continuously reimagined. Inspired by my background in theatre and vocal performance, I carry a love for transformation. Each photograph is a moment from an unfolding, internal play - some staged, others stolen in their spontaneity. I am drawn to both the narrative and the pause, and the in-betweens that often say the most. At the heart of my work lies duality - photography as both mirror and threshold. Within this poetic tension, I explore the tender seams of psyche, ego, spirit, and soul, crafting visual subjects that feel both intimate and yet universal. With my camera as compass, I trace the intricate edges of my inner world seeking the moments where emotion spills into form. Through ICM, blur, and multiple exposures, I craft images that invite connection, where vulnerability becomes vision and the personal transforms into the universal.

QUIN DE LA MER



BIOGRAPHY

Quin de la Mer (American, b. 1966) is a posthumanist artist whose work traces the entanglement of materiality, spiritual abstraction, and ecological transformation. Moving fluidly between abstract painting, alternative photography, and ritual-based art-making, they collaborate with natural forces—spirits of place, spectral presences, and more-than-human intelligences—to reveal what lies beneath perception. Their practice spans monumental oil paintings created with foraged pigments to delicate cyanotype and phytogram prints shaped by wind, plant chemistry, and atmospheric conditions. These works become sites of attention, mapping invisible relationships between body, matter, and memory. Whether using wildfire ash, limestone, or iron oxide, de la Mer treats each substance as a co-creative force.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

I work in monochrome because it allows the pigment itself to lead. For Iron Nests, I painted with iron sediment sourced from waste streams of acid mine drainage—material born of extraction's violent afterlives. Once suspended in toxic water, this iron is reclaimed as pigment, transformed into a site of alchemy and witnessing. Its spectrum ranges from rust to violet-black, carrying both the wound of ecological harm and the possibility of renewal. In purple, the work inhabits a threshold between bruise and bloom, ruin and regeneration, the earthly and the spectral. Gesture and rhythm hold the surface in subtle tension, creating a visual pulse that slows the eye and invites attentive relation.

This oil painting was created using pigments filtered from rivers once choked by iron-rich mining waste. The color is not derived from traditional earth pigments, but rather from residues of environmental collapse: iron oxides and minerals extracted from contaminated waters. And yet, from this toxic matter, life is returning. This painting is both elegy and offering—holding the trace of destruction and the quiet promise of renewal, as rivers begin to breathe again. It marks the threshold between ruin and resilience—where transformation begins.

ELENA POPOVA



BIOGRAPHY

I am a Russian-born artist currently living and working in Cyprus. My work explores the emotional nature of light, breath, and silence. I paint primarily in oil and watercolor, moving between expressive atmospheric painting and detailed botanical drawing — always seeking the quiet presence within the image. I studied art history and painting at the St. Petersburg Institute of Culture and trained at the Stroganov Academy in Moscow. My artworks have been exhibited internationally and recognized in professional juried exhibitions such as Russian Art Week and Art Week in Asia. In my practice, I'm deeply drawn to rhythm — not only visual rhythm, but the rhythm of breath, pause, and stillness. This has led me to develop two original painting methods. Dynamic Light Stratigraphy focuses on layering emotional light in oil painting. RESPIRA explores how inhalation and exhalation shape composition, brushwork, and space. Green, to me, is the color of memory, presence, and recovery. I often

paint water, plants, and open air — not as subjects, but as inner states. Whether I'm working on a sea horizon or a single leaf, I try to create a visual pause: something living, silent, and real. My work has been shown in galleries and publications across Europe and Asia. But more than anything, I paint to listen — and to invite others into the stillness where color becomes breath.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

Purple, for me, is a colour that breathes between calm and emotion. It carries a quiet strength — gentle, but impossible to ignore. When I paint in violet tones, I think about moments of stillness that feel alive, like twilight before night fully falls. There's warmth hidden inside its coolness, and something tender behind its depth. Through this colour, I try to capture a sense of balance — where feeling turns into light, and silence begins to move.

BIOGRAPHY

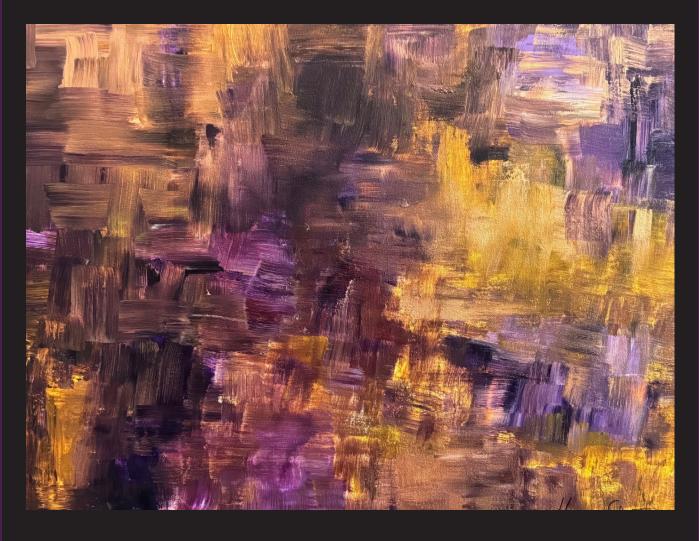

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

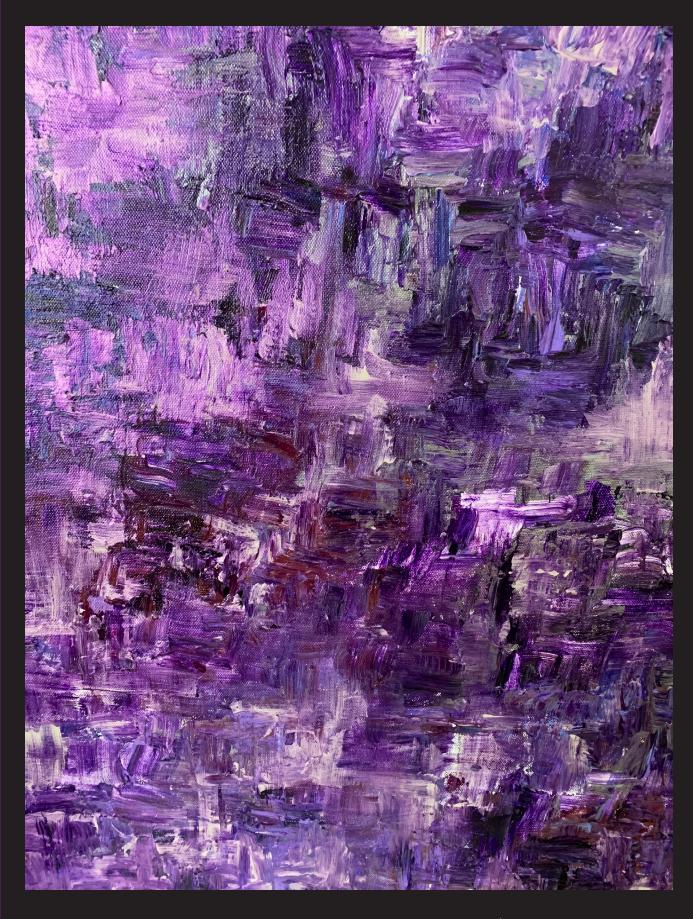

JG BENKOFSKY-WEBB



BIOGRAPHY

The medium I chose through school and my early twenties was figurative clay work, during the late 1960's, graduating from New York University in 1968. It was when I started raising children—and artwork was subject to being abandoned for days, weeks, even months—that I transitioned to fiber and textiles. I made a lot of banners with commercial felt—for births and other occasions. Stitching, knitting, stuffing—I explored these. I learned the art of felt making. This fiber/textile phase began around 1971, extending into the present. I have been negligent in recording competitions and shows I have been in, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Toronto, Ontario, Canada; and Kona, Hawaii. During this time, I was also drawn to the healing modality Therapeutic Touch, which I taught and practiced for twenty years, and which led me to become a licensed massage therapist and yoga teacher. Meanwhile, seven children grew into adulthood, teaching me many lessons

along the way. Having had wonderful experiences with these careers, I have come to realize lately that it is the making of art—the markmaking, the cutting, tearing, pasting, stitching—that I need to be engaging in, if I want to save my life. To quote Mark Nepo: "As no one can live without inhaling and exhaling, no one can live without feeling and expressing. The life of expression is how the heart breathes and how our spirit grows in the life that carries it." It is this "life of expression," through these materials I choose, that mends and sustains me.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

So, it's all drawing. This is what came to me strongly--whether with pencil or with needle and thread or a piece of yarn, it's all drawing. I am making marks; I am drawing. Every technique has its own set of rules and limitations. Can that--oops!--mistake be fixed; or it is time to bail and start over? During this process I was struck with the impact that can be felt by the choice of a tiny stitch made by a single strand of thread. Is the quality of that mark--of that stitch--serving the whole or does it detract? (And please, no blood on the final piece.)

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

Joanna is an ink artist based in Sheffield, UK, inspired and influenced by the surrealistic approach of Salvador Dali and M.C. Escher. She is dedicated to working with abstract, fantasy pieces and aims to explore the beauty of the human spirit through her art. Joanna mainly works with black and white pen and ink drawings as well as acrylic painting, resulting in dramatic and surrealistic compositions that evoke an intricate, mysterious world. As an artist, she believes in using complex lines to create powerful concepts. Her work is driven by a passion to capture the underlying beauty and energy of things by honing into the fundamental line, exploring the limitless possibilities of the imagination. Her drawing doesn't reference the recognisable form. The results are deconstructed to the extent that meaning is shifted and possible interpretation becomes multifaceted.

MAX STEELE



BIOGRAPHY

Max is a fine art photographer and artist focusing on contemplative compositions of the natural and man-made environments around the globe. The excitement he finds in the ordinary things and events of life are captured and revealed in his unusual approach to photography and the printing process. After a successful career in architecture and teaching for more than five decades, Steele left the corporate world to pursue his passion for art and photography. Max, a visionary architect, made his reputation by creating and designing magical and compelling spaces for shopping, playing and working. Steele had the opportunity to travel the world and photographed what inspired him. These images reveal unique, new art by manipulating textures, colors, and symbols. Max's digital prints have been exhibited in numerous cross-country shows. One of these shows launched a new direction for him combining images and printing multiple layered photographs.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My images tell stories – they can be mysterious, ambiguous and ephemeral – many of which challenge your memory and put extra meaning in "sense of place." Viewers are welcome to speculate and create their own story. This process is very spontaneous and draws inspiration from the montage art by Robert Rauschenberg and other printmakers. Some prints are accomplished by hand manipulation during the inkjet printing process. They involve a strong degree of serendipity familiar to the Japanese esthetic of Wabi-Sabi which allows for the ephemeral and imperfect to play a role. I find beauty in old metal scraps, broken glass, mud puddles in the street, cracked, concrete walls lining urban alleys. I orchestrate the elements of the composition with the magic of sun rays. I prefer to work in a gestural sketch-like manner, quick and visceral not overworking or overthinking. I like to keep the work on an emotional basis, highlighting the aspects of the abstract expressionists. Gratitude: Henri Cartier-Bresson, Andre Kertesz and Saul Leiter and painter, Franz Kline.

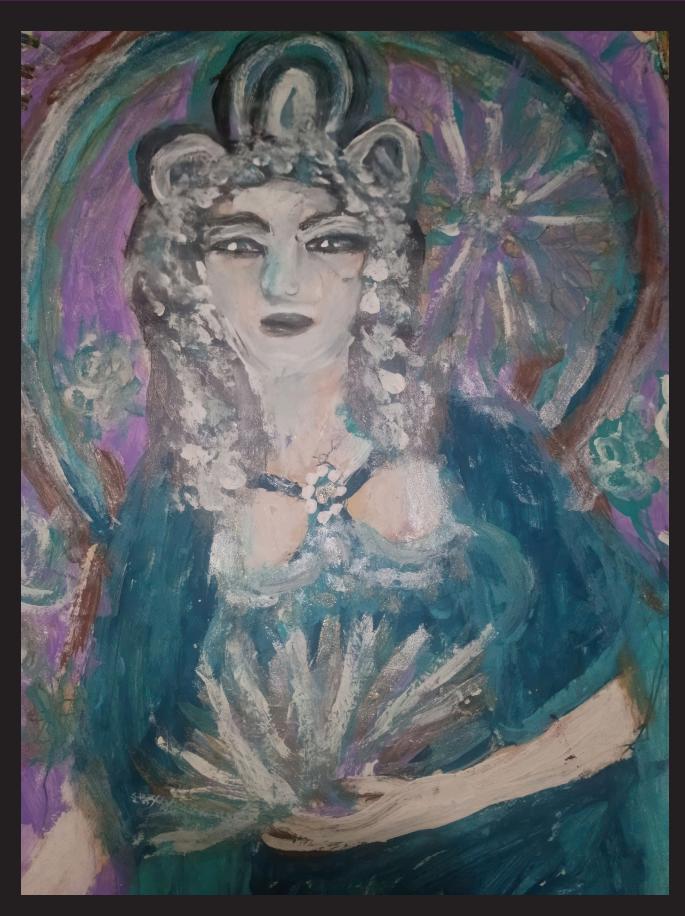

BRUCE FAYMAN



BIOGRAPHY

Bruce Fayman is a photo based digital artist whose work focuses on the complex relationship between plants labeled as "weeds" and the environments they inhabit. The works were originally shot in a variety of states across the U.S Bruce Fayman was born and raised in San Diego, California. Many of Bruce's early creative years were spent in the world of music. A drummer and vocalist, Bruce wrote songs, produced records, and performed with various bands in the Southern California area. Playing alongside his brother, Corey L. Fayman. Their band, Bad Dog, enjoyed considerable local success in San Diego. Having grown up in a household filled with abstract art, Bruce found his voice in the visual arts through the digital medium where he seeks to blend the lines between photography and other 2D media. His subject matter sprang from his fascination with invasive plants and their effect on the environments they inhabit. His father, Lynn G. Fayman, was a well-known abstract photographer

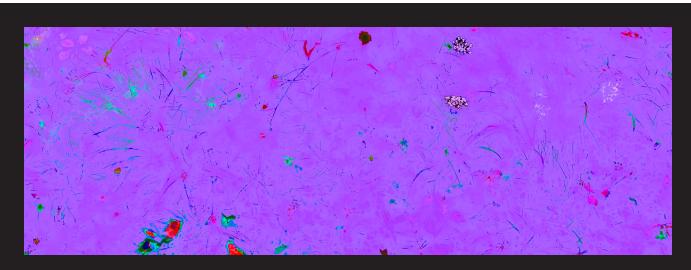
whose work included hand-tinted Kodak Flexichrome, is a key influence on Bruce's work.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

Subversive Beauty An open field, rolling hillside, or urban canyon covered with orange, yellow, or purple flowers can produce stunning landscapes that inspire artists, photographers, or anyone who appreciates natural beauty. But frequently, those flowers are weeds or intruders growing beyond their native boundaries, invading new habitats. Some are natural plants that have been labeled weeds because they threaten domesticated animals or crops. Others were introduced long ago by well-meaning amateur gardeners, early explorers, and professional landscapers, or carried to remote locations by hooves, boots, or wheels. Either way, humans have enabled these plants to redesign or recolor our views of the environments we see every day. Some of these intruders move in gradually, blurring the line between natural and unnatural. They thrive, changing the landscape's appearance and altering what we recognize as beautiful. We label these interlopers subversive, aggressive, invasive, noxious, yet they are almost always beautiful - deceptively beautiful. My work focuses on the strain put on natural environments by these weeds and our complex relationship with them. We have forever changed our fields, urban parks, and landscapes into something manipulated, man made. I shot my photographs in the fields, backyards, and roadsides where these plants now thrive. I then digitally altered and manipulated the photographs to create these images, reinforcing the complexity of our relationship to the natural world.

BIOGRAPHY

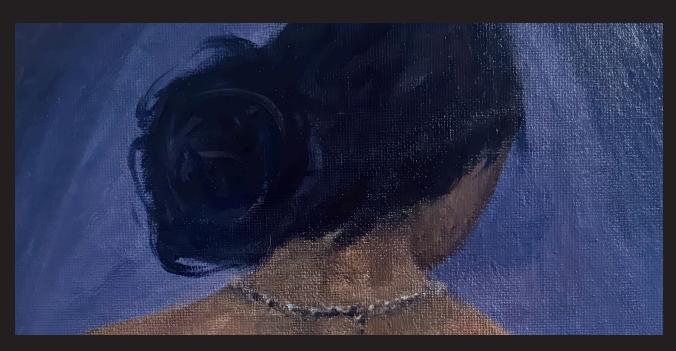

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

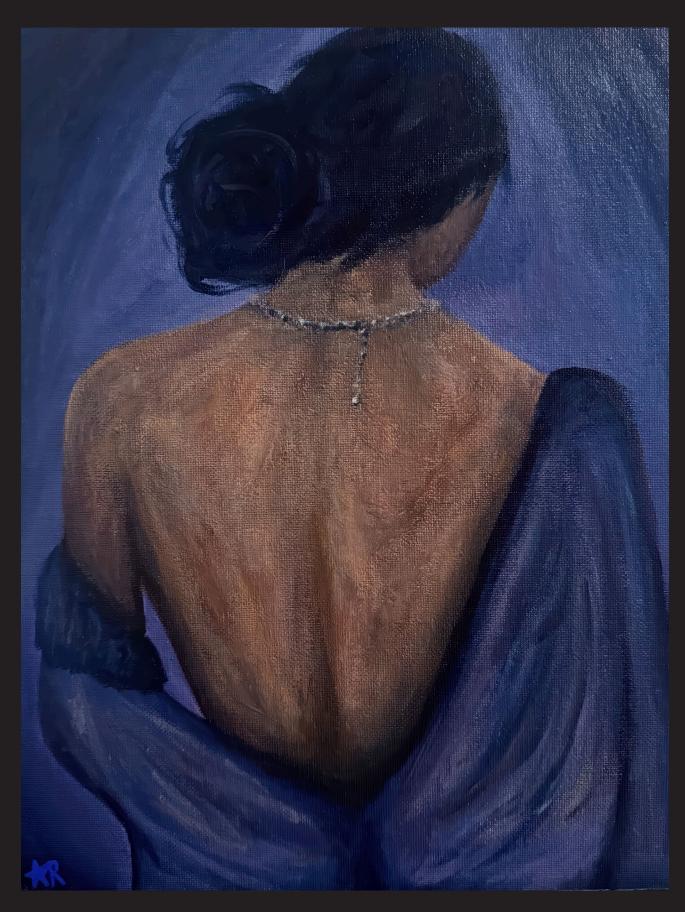

BIOGRAPHY

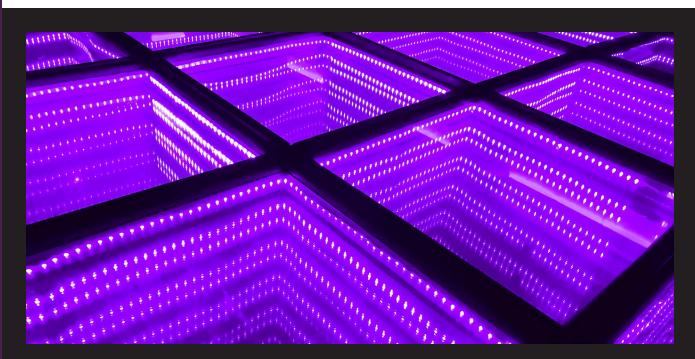

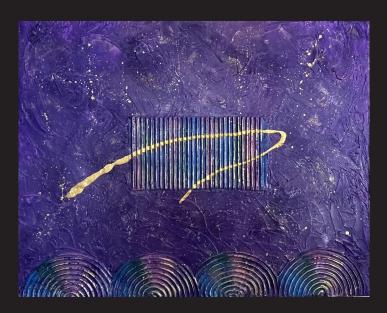

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My work is rooted in emotional honesty and catharsis. I use colorful and textured found material in my work as a vehicle to create varied moods from humorous to somber. My work makes heavy use of space as a compositional tool. My art relies on a focal point for either a joke or a sobering revelation. Compositions are built around bolstering the main joke. The use of subtle techniques such as leaving areas of surface open as a way to exaggerate contrasting elements of color and texture is what creates the central moment. I place a particular interest in trash found from street corners. Thematically, this serves two purposes. The first is to raise attention to how cycles of consumption and waste can be disrupted through visibility and creativity. The second and more personal of the two is the idea of transforming materials deemed unwanted or unworthy into valuable assemblages rich with meaning.

BIOGRAPHY

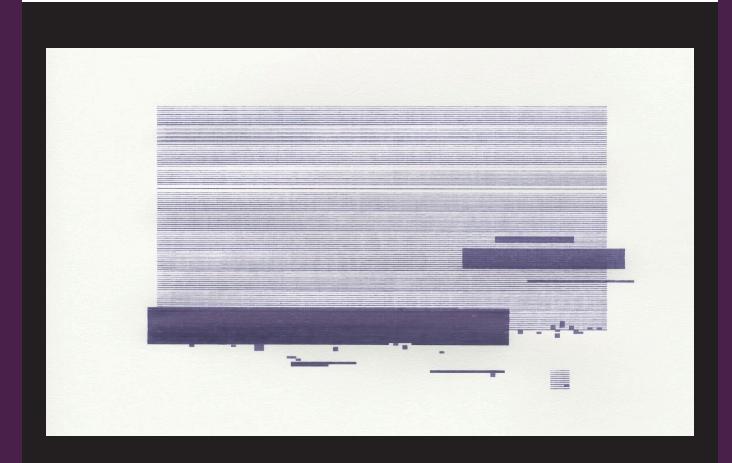

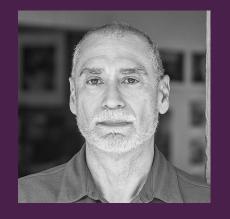

Title: Mangwanani Medium: Graphite, Charcoal, and Acrylic on Paper Mangwanani, meaning "good morning" in the Shona language, greets the viewer with a figure that embodies both strength and serenity. The subject emerges in graphite and charcoal, their form grounded in figurative realism. Arms cross over the chest in a gesture that conveys both protection and self-embrace. Subtle choices, such as leaving only some nails painted, preserve its identity as a figurative drawing rather than a painting. From the crown radiates a striking burst of acrylic petals in warm pinks, oranges, and reds—an ethereal sunrise that transforms the figure into a symbol of renewal, hope, and resilience. Set against a rich green background, the contrast between monochrome body and vivid adornment blurs the line between human and natural form, spirit and earth. This work offers a meditation on beginnings, identity, and empowerment—a visual "good morning" that invites reflection on awakening and transformation.

BIOGRAPHY

Leticia Razo is a multidisciplinary artist, ritual practitioner, and accessibility advocate based in Fort Worth, Texas. Her work channels metaphysical and ancestral truths into tangible forms—encoded paintings, sigils, relics, and scrolls that serve as living archives and visual invocations. Each piece is a site of remembrance and resistance, crafted to restore silenced archetypes and forgotten cosmologies. Leticia's practice is rooted in care and transformation. She blends ritual, art, and advocacy to honor both personal and collective memory, often working with themes of grief, justice, and sanctuary. Her commitment to accessibility is central: she crafts alt text and inclusive descriptions that allow visually impaired audiences to experience her archive with dignity and depth. Her archive has been shared across sacred spaces, digital platforms, and institutional venues, including recent submissions to Creative West and Ivy League applications. She continues to refine her artist

statements and biographies to distill vision into language—bridging the metaphysical with the practical. Leticia dreams of a sanctuary—a house and painting room where her archive can breathe and her family feels safe. I dream of a house and a painting room where my family feels safe and my archive can breathe. Until then, I paint, I write, I remember.

Working exclusively with oil paints, Josephine creates works across a variety of genres, including portraiture, landscape, religious art, still life, animal painting, and marine scenes. Her artistic style, which she defines as "modern vintage," blends the emotional depth of classical traditions with a fresh, contemporary aesthetic. Josephine Florens is a member of the College Art Association (CAA) — the leading professional organization in the visual arts and design

(CAA ID: C-264816), a member of Odessa Marine Art Union (Ukraine). Her paintings reflect a deep sensitivity to beauty, symbolism, and human emotion, making her a unique voice in the world of contemporary figurative art.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

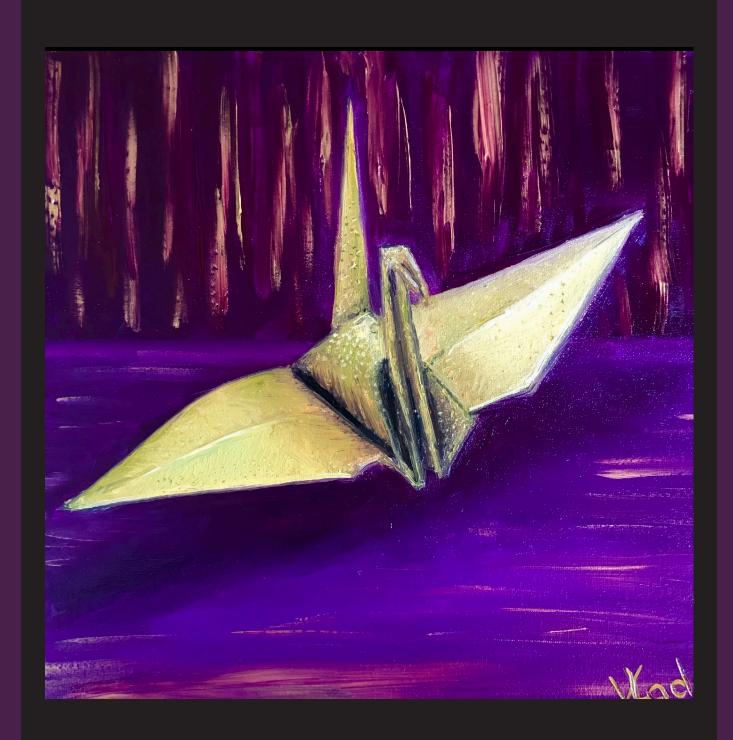
My work is rooted in a fusion of classical technique and surreal intuition. I am particularly drawn to color-dominant compositions that evoke emotional contrast, and purple serves here as a gateway into dreamlike, symbolic states. Whether it's the piercing gaze of lemurs seated on a fuzzy magenta stool, a pulsating nerve cell entangled in organic tension, or the meditative stillness of a golden origami crane—each painting reflects my exploration of vulnerability, transformation, and hidden emotional resonance. I work primarily in oil on canvas, using layered brushwork, textured impasto, and carefully placed light to guide the viewer's focus. Each composition evolves from an emotional impulse rather than a fixed sketch, allowing subconscious forms and symbolic imagery to surface organically. The tactile richness of the paint is essential—I want the physicality of the surface to echo the depth of feeling within. This particular selection of works emerged from a period of intense internal recalibration. Purple, in its multiplicity, became a symbol of contradiction: it is regal and strange, spiritual and tense, vibrant yet restrained. Through it, I seek to build visual spaces that invite pause, curiosity, and connection. My aim is to offer a quiet intensity—images that unfold in layers over time, revealing unexpected stories and sensations.

HELEN HINES



BIOGRAPHY

Helen Hines (artist alias Kėkė Søl) is a Berlin-based multidisciplinary artist working at the intersection of film, sound, and performance. With a background in philosophy and literature from Yale University ('17) and extensive research in somatic practice, she has developed a cross-disciplinary approach grounded in presence and relation. Film has become her central medium, where she investigates intimacy, vulnerability, and the dynamics of witnessing and being seen. Her process is improvisational and embodied, dissolving the line between performance and authenticity while reframing power through practices of listening, touch, and care. Recent works explore grief, ecology, and queer-feminist and new-materialist thought, treating the body and environment as sites of transformation. A recent film, created during research in Japan, lingers on abandoned spaces and landscapes as vessels of memory and loss, engaging Pauline Oliveros' Deep Listening methodology through field recording and image-making to transform cinema into a medium of meditation.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

For Hines, filmmaking is not representation but encounter — an improvisational act of witnessing. She approaches the camera as a partner in intimacy, a vessel for relation rather than control. Working without scripts, she allows silence, attention, and the micro-shifts of vulnerability to guide the frame. Each image emerges as a negotiation of power and care, a record of what happens when presence itself becomes the subject. In her recent works, this ethos takes shape through attunement to place: filming abandoned houses and overgrown forests not as static objects, but as vibrant matter carrying traces of grief, memory, and transformation. Practices of deep listening reveal time's accumulation in stone, wood, and soil. Such works invite slowness and surrender, holding space for film as meditation — an ongoing act of sensing relation, where perception itself becomes a tender form of care.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

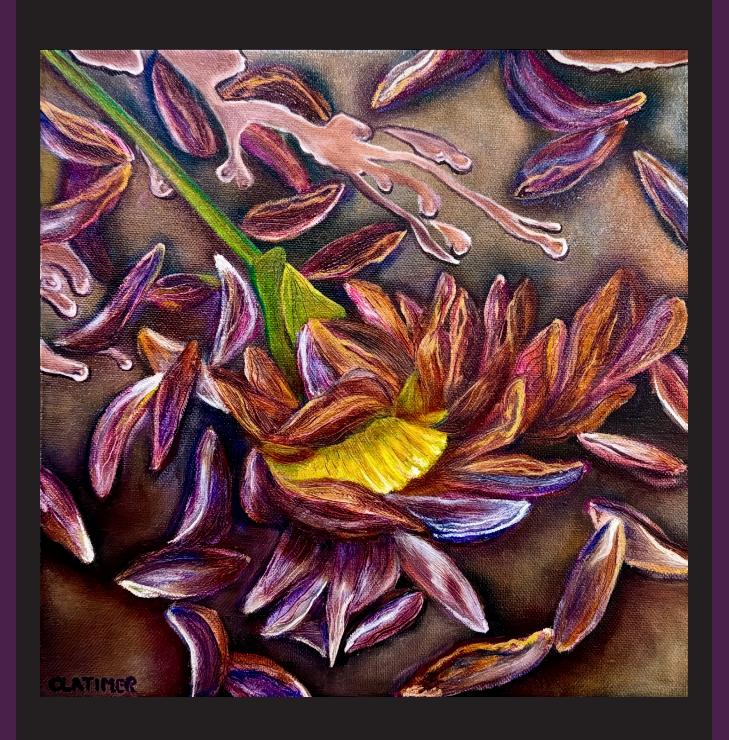

BIOGRAPHY

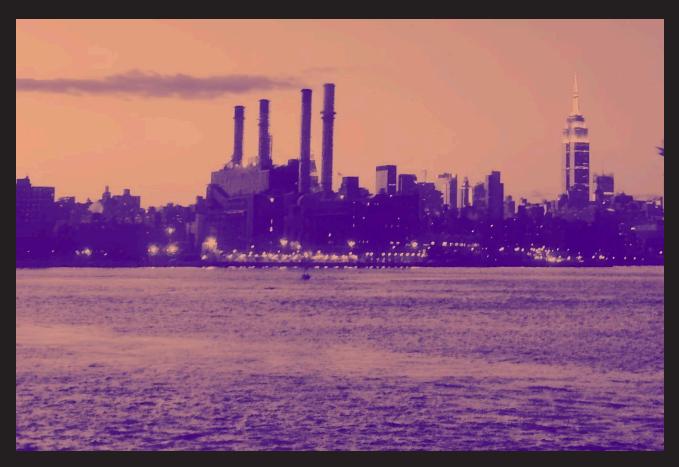

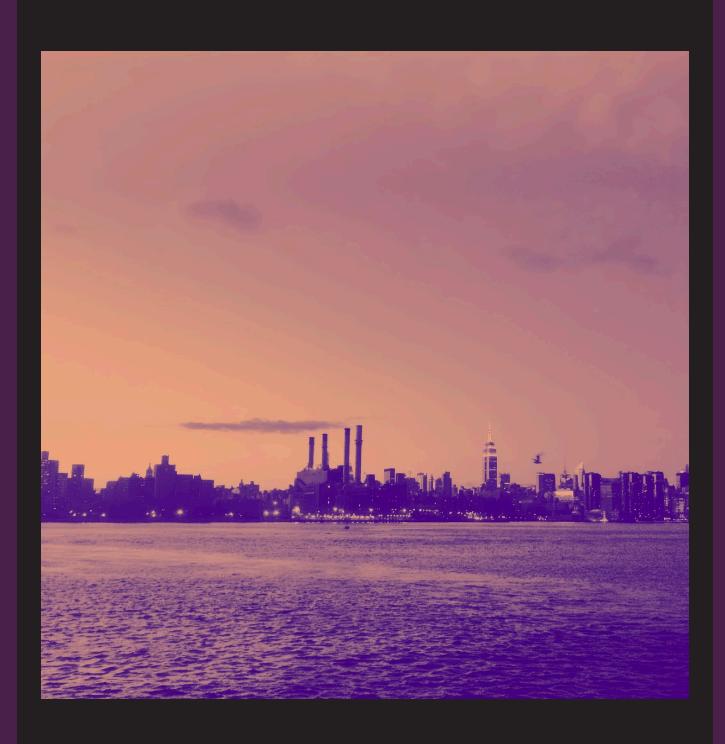

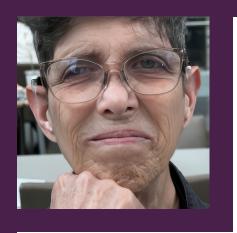

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

These oil paintings explore memory and landscape with complex spatial environments that hover between painterly realism and abstract passages. Raised in rural Wisconsin, Florida and Texas piqued my interest in diverse landscapes, flora and fauna. Whether a mass of color blur or the focal point of a bloom, each is recording its environment and time. A meditative connection to the wild land comes with observation and ecological awareness. I am part of the Planet Earth's complex system with respect for the Earth and our environment. We are all part of this system which weaves a connection to the spirit, composition and life on Earth. My chemical engineering background is reflected in my creative practice focusing on materials and process. The bold use of initial marks that swirl through the backgrounds of floral compositions, echo and amplify the rhythms of the more naturally drawn floral elements. Visual density from transparent to opaque are leveraged in creating organic textures. Color is a vehicle to convey energy from nature. These works nod to influences from Henri Matisse, Paul Cezanne, Pierre Bonnard and Robert Kushner.

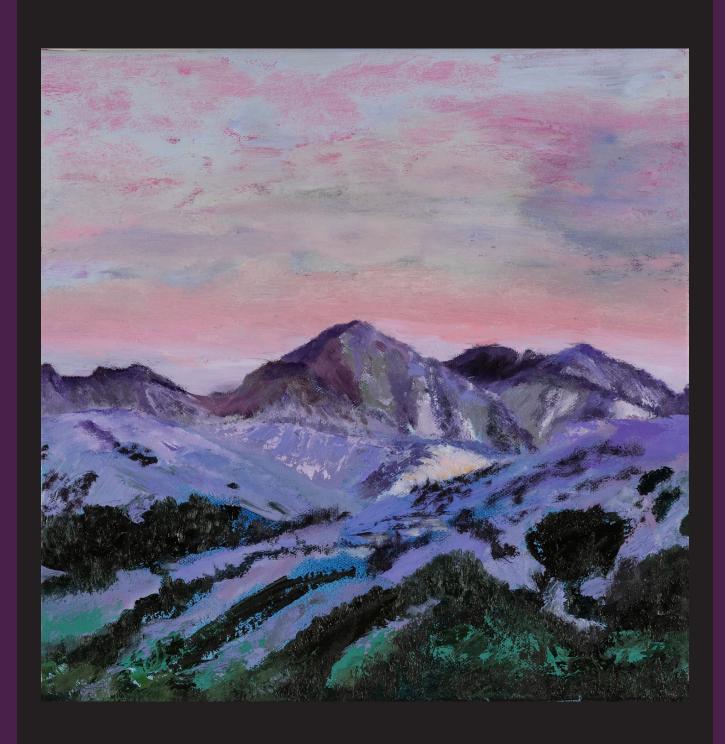

JANE BEISELL



BIOGRAPHY

A native of the Pacific Northwest, Jane Beisell is a mixed media artist whose work reflects a deep reverence for the natural world. Surrounded by lush landscapes, quiet forests, and the fleeting beauty of wildflowers, she approaches art as both a meditative practice and a celebration of nature's resilience and fragility. From an early age, Jane was captivated by small wonders—fallen petals, moss-covered stones, shifting light through leaves. These details form the foundation of her creative process today. Her work often begins with watercolor, acrylic, or ink, then evolves through the layering of real, preserved flora. Dried petals, ferns, and stems are thoughtfully arranged into compositions that feel organic yet intentional, bridging the space between painting and collage. Textured and translucent, her pieces invite viewers to pause, look closer, and reconnect with the fragile beauty around them. Jane's visual language was shaped by early studies in East Asian calligraphy

and brush painting, where she learned the value of restraint, rhythm, and the expressive power of a single line. These influences remain visible through gestural marks, flowing compositions, and a thoughtful balance of precision and spontaneity. As her practice expanded to include acrylics and more experimental media, she has kept the discipline of her calligraphic roots while embracing the freedom of mixed media expression. Though trained in calligraphy painting, much of Jane's growth has been self-directed. She draws inspiration from both tradition and modern exploration, engaging with online communities and platforms such as YouTube and TikTok to discover new methods and connect with fellow artists. Living and working in the Pacific Northwest, Jane continues to draw daily inspiration from the landscape outside her door. Her work remains an ongoing exploration of materials, memory, and the seasons—an invitation to slow down, notice, and celebrate the quiet resilience of the natural world.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My work is rooted in the idea of transience—the way plants bloom, fade, and return in cycles, echoing the constant change inherent in life. By embedding real botanical material into my pieces, I capture moments that would otherwise be lost, honoring impermanence and making it tangible. Each artwork becomes both a meditation and an invitation—for viewers to slow down, observe closely, and reconnect with the overlooked wonders in their own environment. I approach my practice as both visual and tactile. I find joy in gathering materials—pressing wildflowers, experimenting with layering mediums, and discovering how natural textures interact with paint. My studio often feels like a blend of painter's workspace and botanical archive, where every decision, from the gesture of a brushstroke to the placement of a single petal, is intentional. At the same time, my art reflects a broader journey through nature and spirituality, shaped by moments of stillness and diverse cultural influences. Using mixed media—paint, ink, asemic writing, found objects, textiles, and preserved botanicals—I create layered compositions that embody narrative and texture. I embrace experimentation, allowing process to guide me, and often find that the act of creating becomes as meaningful as the final piece. For me, beauty is not only in the monumental but in the small, quiet details: the curl of a stem, the balance of colors, the echo of a leaf's silhouette. Through my work, I hope to evoke reverence and reflection, reminding us that wisdom, strength, and resilience often reside in life's most delicate, fleeting moments.

For me, painting is a form of "unrestricted self-dialogue" and "finding moments of peace." It's a process of crystallizing inexpressible emotions and the invisible world. My paintings often feature eyes of varying shapes, parts of limbs, and deformed animals and plants. I suspect these images stem from my inner darkness, insecurity, and longing for the unknown. I prefer to paint with a palette knife rather than a brush. The undulating layers of each stroke make the painting feel like a living entity. I have never received formal artistic training, and my colors and brushstrokes are mostly spontaneous, unconstrained by any technical constraints. This, in turn, helps me express the current fluctuations of my soul, which can be impulsive, spontaneous, and mysterious. I hope the viewers can sense their inner imagination in my paintings and feel the same freedom as I do, unconstrained by frameworks.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

'violetboi' (2018) features an old friend and male dancer, seated on a stool, head downcast, and eyes closed. He holds a flower petal held between fingers, casting a shadow over his shirt, which is adorned by additional petals. This portrait is the seventh and final piece of a digital photography series titled 'rainbois' (2018). Debuting at my first solo exhibition, 'iris: an

exploration of color', the series was an opportunity to explore my relationship with emotions, men, masculinity, and love through color portrait photographs. With photography, I'm most curious of street/urban settings, the more-than-human world, everyday objects, and the interplay of shadow and light. Portraits rarely excite me, yet my relationship and friendship with each of the models encouraged me to go beyond my comfort zone. I was also excited to use an actual photography studio. On technique, I used a DSLR camera and light filters within the studio. I encouraged the model to position his body in ways that felt good to him, having casual conversation to offer ease and build rapport, while capturing their likeness. After selecting an image I felt complimented the series, I played with the original photograph's color, increasing saturation using Adobe Photoshop. On the intent of 'violetboi': Queer Black men attuned with their femininity are worthy of being witnessed.

BIOGRAPHY

Anne Bown-Crawford is an interdisciplinary new media artist whose work explores the intersections of art, science, technology, and the natural environment. Her practice often emerges through collaboration, most recently as an artist-in-residence with Google's Quantum AI Research Labs, where she engaged researchers in imaginative exchanges that bridged quantum science and creative expression. As a principal with DRAWEVERYWHERE's Creative Exchange Program, she continues to develop cross-disciplinary projects that generate dialogue between visual art, design, and cutting-edge research. Her current work extends beyond the studio into public space. As senior consultant for California State Parks' Arts in Parks initiative, Bown-Crawford is shaping a program that places contemporary art within natural landscapes, inviting audiences to experience the intersection of environmental stewardship and creative practice. This reflects her long-standing interest in how art reframes

human relationships with place, ecology, and community. Alongside her practice, Bown-Crawford has amplified the role of artists within civic and cultural life. As Executive Director of the California Arts Council, she championed initiatives such as the California Creative Corps and the expansion of Cultural Districts, supporting artists as catalysts for cultural vitality and community transformation. Whether engaging scientists in speculative dialogue, embedding art in public landscapes, or leading statewide initiatives, Bown-Crawford's work demonstrates a belief in art as a force for curiosity, connection, and cultural change.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

Correlated & Entangled: Art and Science in Collaboration This artwork is part of a body of work that emerges from a dynamic exchange between me, an artist, and the scientists of Google's Quantum Computing Research team. Our collaboration fosters curiosity, trust, and delight, allowing the worlds of art and science to become entangled in ways that sparked innovation, creativity, and discovery. Through thought-provoking and often playful engagement, we develop a shared vocabulary and vision, bridging the gap between scientific inquiry and artistic expression. As an artist, my goal is to push the boundaries of image-making and fabrication, exploring new processes that challenge traditional approaches. At the same time, I seek to inspire scientists to embrace creativity in their problem-solving, encouraging them to view their work through a fresh lens. Together, we cultivate connections between ideas and foster a holistic, creative culture within Google's quantum community. What begins as a conversation about the striking visual and auditory aesthetics of quantum computing then evolves into an immersive and interdisciplinary dialogue, culminating in some of the work displayed here.

CHAD MCCORD



BIOGRAPHY

Chad McCord is a multidisciplinary artist based in Los Angeles whose work explores emotion, memory, and identity through experimental abstraction. He works in acrylic, dyed and disrupted paper, removable vinyl, photography, shrink wrap, cork, Colorforms, and sculptural assemblage—fusing tactile materials with vivid color to create pieces that are both personal and universal. Color is central to Chad's practice—not just as visual language but as emotional terrain. Purple, in particular, recurs throughout his work as a symbol of duality: grief and power, nostalgia and transformation, royalty and rebellion. Whether working in layered paper, cut canvas, or painted board, Chad uses color to speak when words fall short. His creative process often begins horizontally, allowing instinct to guide placement, tearing, and texture. Only after the piece is "felt through" does it rotate vertically—revealing its true form through composition and negative space. This approach echoes childhood creativity:

bold, imperfect, exploratory, and honest. Key themes in Chad's work include the reimagining of childhood, emotional reclamation, and the healing potential of artistic play. His methods—ripping, layering, discarding, rebuilding—mirror the ways we process feeling and memory. Chad earned his bachelor's degree with a focus on Acting, Art, and Education from the University of Oregon. He has worked for over three decades as an actor and acting coach, and is an award-winning filmmaker whose short films (Stay With Me, FYD) explore emotional nuance and human connection. Current multidisciplinary projects include: — Private Hell: Nursery Rhymes for Grown-Ups — a book of illustrated, subversive rhymes. — 2:29 — an experimental art film composed of 229 photos of his husband in a cab at 2:29 a.m. McCord's work is a celebration of intuitive creation—reminding us to play outside the lines and letting us know he won't go quietly.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My work is rooted in emotion — raw, layered, and unapologetic. As a child, I was taught to hide my feelings, but art became my sanctuary. Through bold color, deconstruction, and playful materials, I invite the viewer to connect — to laugh, cry, cringe, dance, remember, or just stand there and go, "What the hell is this?" I work in acrylic, paper, vinyl, shrink wrap, cork, felt, photography, and found materials — often ripping, layering, dyeing, or distorting them until they become something unexpected. My process is physical, intuitive, and often cathartic. I use tools like power washers, rollers, tape, and my own hands. It's about releasing the pressure valve — purging what's inside and making space for something new. Recurring themes in my work include childhood reimagined, emotional release, queerness, memory, grief, and color as therapy. I want my pieces to bypass logic and hit the nerve — like a pop song you didn't know you needed. My series range from sculptural cutout diptychs of organic matter (Organic-A), to grief-based abstract works made after the death of my parents, to interactive installations like Gay Laundry and Private Hell: Nursery Rhymes for Grown-Ups. I also bring decades of experience in film and television into my visual art practice — incorporating storytelling, performance, and video into works like my art film 2:29, which examines ritual, repetition, and transformation. I'm building a visual collage of feelings — some loud, some strange, some soft around the edges. If nothing else, it gives my feelings a place to live. — Chad McCord

BIOGRAPHY

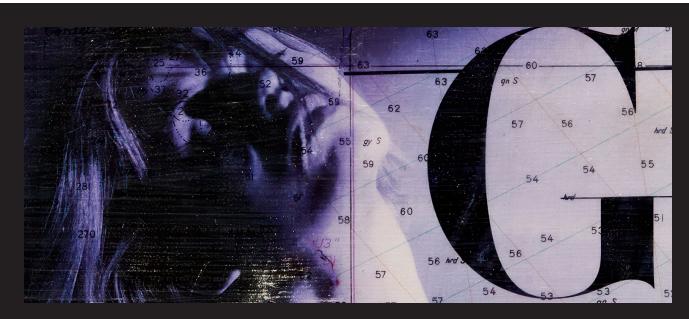

Renowned for his expertise in lighting challenging subjects, James combines his technical skills with a deep passion for design and composition to create striking images that captivate and inspire. Based in Los Angeles, James balances his commercial photography career with his personal artistic pursuits. While he continues to deliver high-quality work for his clients, he also dedicates time to fine art photography, exploring new techniques and pushing creative boundaries. In recent years, James has ventured into the world of analog collage, a medium through which he has found fresh artistic expression and a new way to alter photography and blend it with graphics. His mixed media collages have been met with enthusiasm from galleries and praise from his peers, further solidifying his reputation as a versatile and innovative artist.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

My journey in mixed media collage is rooted in a deep appreciation for form, composition, and the emotional potential of the resulting image. I'm drawn to strong graphic elements, strange juxtapositions, intentional layering and textures—visual choices that create rhythm and tension but ultimately serve a more intuitive goal - to convey feeling over fact. When I make my collages, I'm not excited by the literal qualities of a specific element, but by the emotional response it evokes in me. I deliberately work as an analog collage artist because I value the tactile nature of tearing, cutting and placing elements in the frame. I don't want to work digitally; however, I do use my phone to capture and analyze compositions as I work. This objectifies the work so I can study it in a two-dimensional format and decide what is working and what is not. My work invites the viewer to look past what is immediately visible and step into a more subjective experience. It's this ambiguity—the space between clarity and abstraction—that I find most compelling. Recently, I have incorporated paint into my work pushing it past purely paper collage. I'm not interested in telling a fixed story or delivering a clear message. Instead, I want the viewer to feel something—however subtle or ambiguous. I see the act of collaging as a kind of internal listening—an intuitive reassembling of everyday images, graphics, letters and numbers into something more personal and interpretive.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

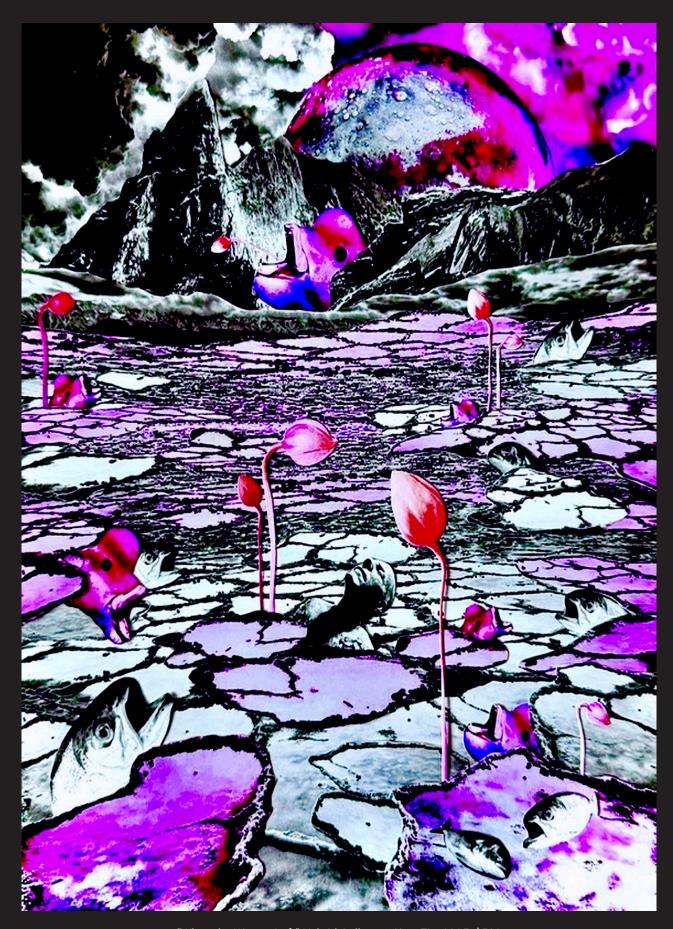
Since 2024, my practice has explored the collapse of linear time and the delicate space between memory and imagination — shifting fluidly between past and future. I create surreal collages in which solitary figures inhabit fractured landscapes that open onto emotional terrains of alienation and renewal. My hybrid process integrates analog and digital techniques: I edit found imagery, print and hand-cut fragments, assemble them physically, then scan and refine the compositions digitally. Finalized as high-resolution gloss Vibrachrome prints, the works can expand in scale while preserving the intimacy of their hand-cut origins. Through this process, I disrupt original meanings, construct new narratives, and invite viewers to question what is real, remembered, or imagined.

BIOGRAPHY

A fine arts degree with a concentration in painting from the University of New Mexico solidified my early interest in making art. My focus on landscapes began with plein-air watercolor painting in the mountains surrounding Albuquerque. After moving to Arizona for a spell, I continued watercolor painting in the hills and washes of the Tucson area. I returned to New Mexico where I have lived and worked for several years in the town of Las Vegas, located between Santa Fe and Taos, amidst an inspiring natural landscape of mountain meadows, pine forests, and the occasional wolf or coyote. I am the owner of Blue Mesa Gallery LLC, am a former member of the Las Vegas artist cooperative gallery El Zócalo, and belong to the Las Vegas Arts Council. Since 2017 I've exhibited in the annual New Mexico Painters' Exhibition invitational on the campus of New Mexico Highlands University (NMHU); in 2019 I had a solo exhibit in the Ray Drew Gallery at NMHU; in July, I was an exhibitor in

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

Through my art, I strive to convey the wonder of the natural world. Art's colors and forms can evoke visceral feelings such as the fragrance of lilacs at midday, the warmth of the sun reflected in a sandstone cliff. Just as music can elicit colors and patterns in its listeners' minds, the visual arts also possess powers of synesthesia. By tapping into this phenomenon, the artist may engage the viewer in subtle and very personal ways. Art is a means of sharing with our fellows, somewhat akin to how the aspen trees support and nourish each other through their intertwining roots. Art is a beautiful way that humans connect. The act of painting for me often involves a rediscovery of a previously visited locale. The real world is my foundation, but I find that its hidden magic can be revealed or magnified by the inclusion of fantastical imagery. While my main media are acrylics and watercolors, I also enjoy working in pastels. As a counterbalance to the arid landscapes that surround me, I enjoy travelling to settings with abundant water such as the waterfalls and ocean waters of Hawaii, and the pine-covered beaches of the Great Lakes, which offer a different kind of energy for the mind and the heart. No matter where I am, nature inspires my imagination. In the words of artist Edvard Munch, "Nature is not only all that is visible to the eye...it also includes the inner pictures of the soul."

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

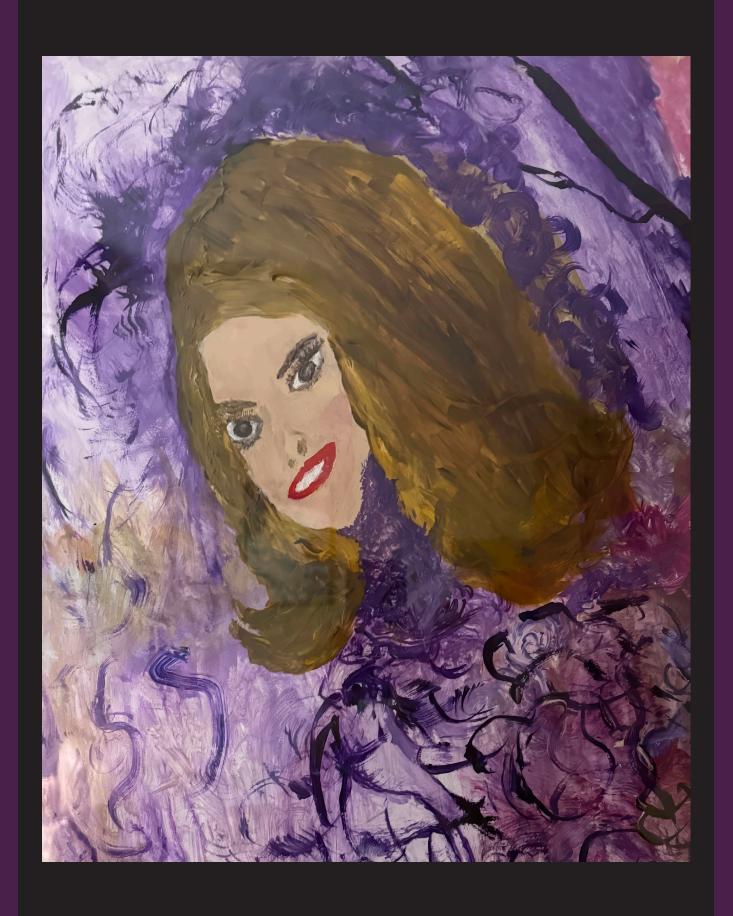

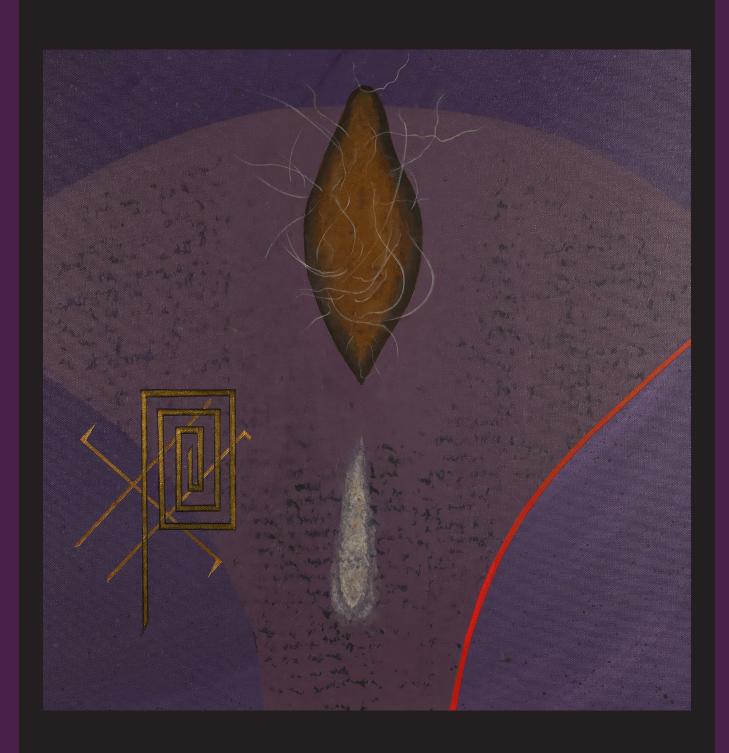

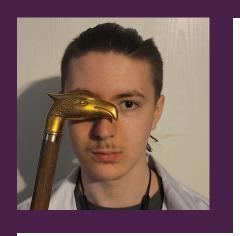

I decided to render the soldier in my piece very flatly to further emphasize the bullet holes I carved into the canvas itself. While making this piece, I thought a great deal about my mother, who is a combat veteran who served in the army for more than 20 years. I thought about how my life would've turned out if she had died in combat...

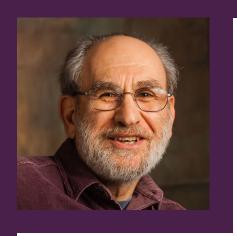
Detail from "Hollow Heart" Acrylic paint on canvas, 40in x 30in x 1in, 2025, NFS

BIOGRAPHY

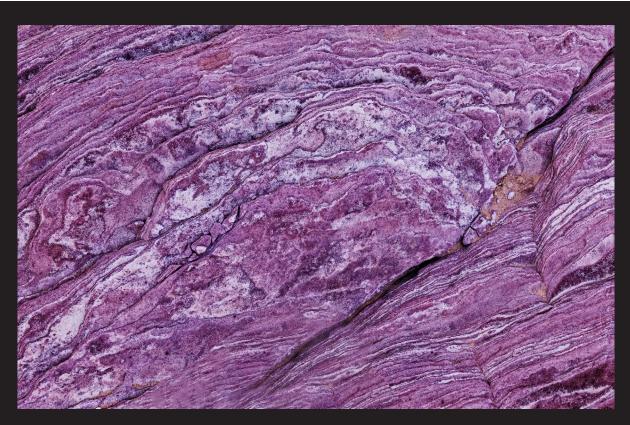

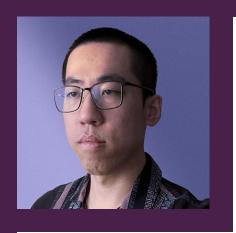


"Purple Formation #4" Photogrpahy, 16in x 20in, 2024, \$425

BIOGRAPHY

Adrienne has been painting for nearly thirty years, beginning with vibrant acrylic portraits of dogs and landscapes. Her subjects were scenes that elicited personal joy – lavender fields, beaches, buildings that had meaning to her. For years she kept her paintings to herself, embarrassed that she had never had any art instruction. Though her work was long affirmed by family and friends, it was only within the past three years that she began to claim the identity of "artist." ARTISTIC STATEMENT

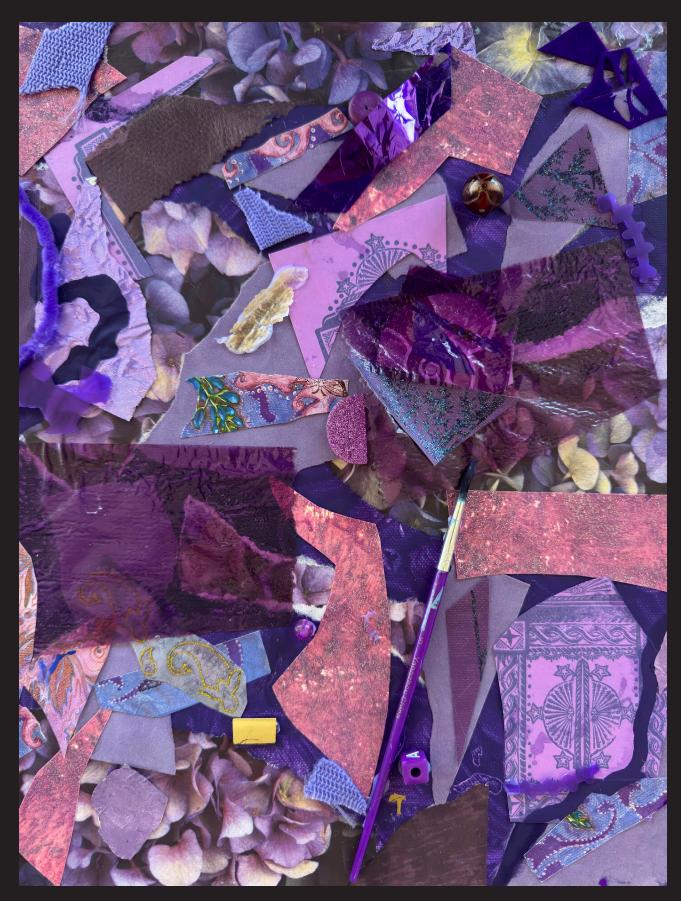
My training in existentialism and intersectionality is expressed materially in my collages crafted from reclaimed materials (really, often trash). My collages are always monochromatic – I place trash in front of me and just pick bits and pieces that speak to me. I don't know how else to describe it. Purple College is the only piece I've ever made in this color. It's like the elements are meant to fit together – like they must be placed where they are to make room for each piece to breathe. Purple Collage includes acrylic paint, paper, vellum, brush wire, fabrics, foil, beads, and a brush gathered from food containers, gift wrap, print materials, and other scrap materials.

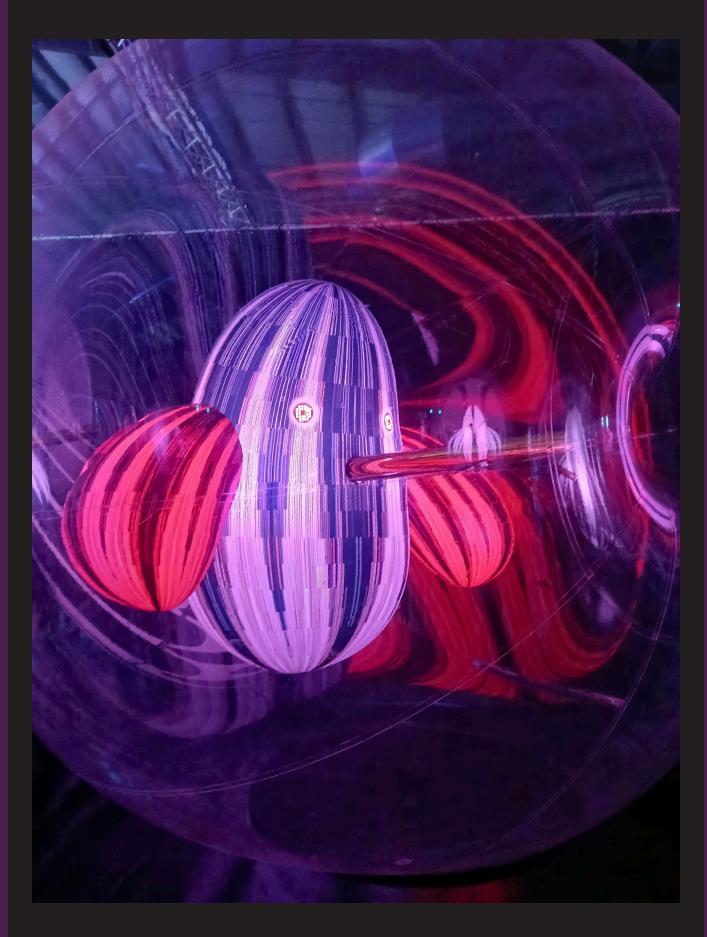

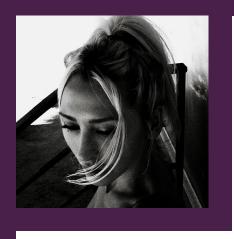

BIOGRAPHY

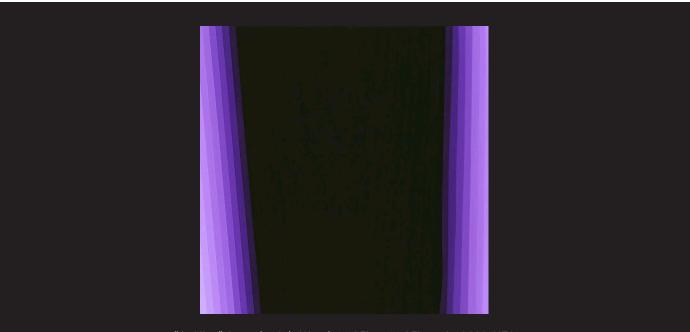

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

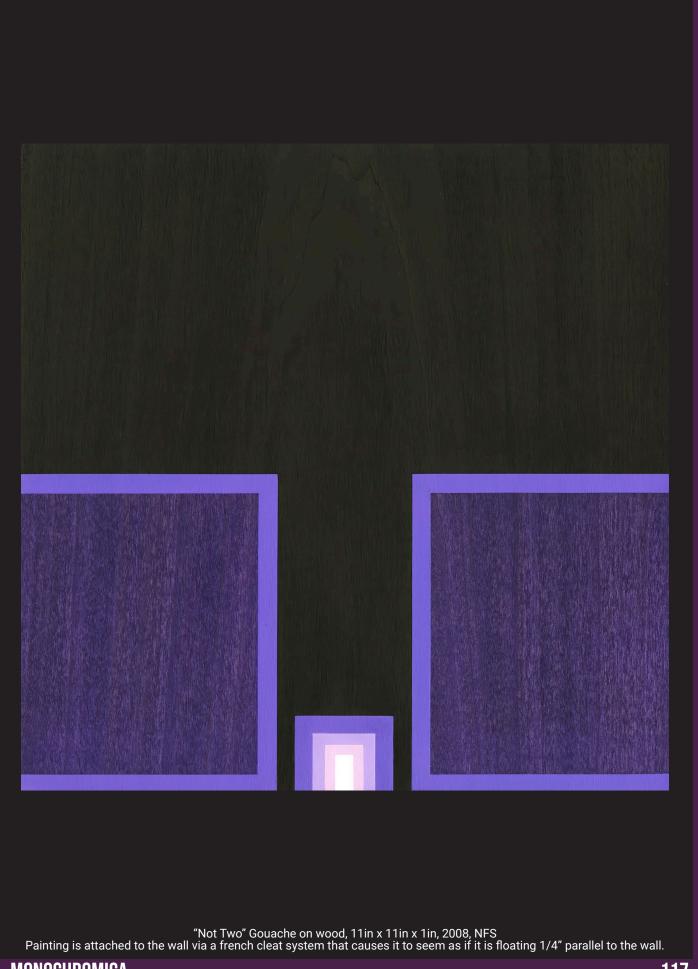
For over twenty years I have spent almost all my time in the studio making delicate small-scale abstract paintings. Inspired by daily life, art history, and religious traditions such as Zen Buddhism and Quaker Christianity, this work explores contemplative spiritual experience. Like many people today I want to define my own spiritual path and do so by borrowing from multiple theological, literary, and artistic precedents. Subsequently, my goal is to create an iconography that is both deeply personal and highly evocative; I want to make lyrically poetic objects that are simultaneously intimate, mysterious, and expansive. My process begins with the basic design and construction materials of gouache and wood. Through the economical use of line, color, texture, and the illusion of light and space, I create a visual dialogue between painted surface and wooden substrate. The sometimes awkward, sometimes tense, sometimes graceful relationships that occurs embodies my own search for meaning - the search for a balance between the organic and the synthetic, the inner and the outer, the intuitive and the rational, the timeless and temporary - a search that is defined by the ritual of making and remaking. Ultimately, I believe that experiences of subtle structural beauty can be incredibly valuable. Because they require quietude during a time of de-humanizing speed, clutter, and noise, they serve as both a foil to the frenetic activity of contemporary life and as a method of sustenance within it.

RONALD CADET



BIOGRAPHY

Ronald Cadet is a Haitian-born fine artist whose work spans painting, sculpture, ceramics, and mixed media, weaving together tradition, philosophy, and contemporary expression. He studied at the National Arts School in Portau-Prince, Haiti (2001–2006), where he mastered the foundations of visual arts, later pursuing Cultural Administration at the Universidad Autónoma de Santo Domingo (2008–2010) in the Dominican Republic, and advanced studies in fiberglass sculpture at the Art Center of Léopold Sédar Senghor (2010–2011) in Dakar, Senegal. This international formation enriched his vision, linking Caribbean identity with the broader African and global artistic dialogue. Cadet's work has been exhibited in museums and galleries across the United States, Europe, and the Caribbean. His career highlights include participation in the 35x35 Art Project permanent exhibition at the Copelouzos Family Art Museum in Athens, Greece (2020–present); the Luxembourg Art

Prize at Pinacothèque Museum (2022); solo and group shows at Myriam Nader Art Gallery, Kenkeleba Art Gallery in Manhattan, and the New York ArtExpo. His exhibitions with Wheaton Arts Organization at Rowan University Art Gallery and Clay College Gallery, as well as cultural centers in New Jersey and New York, further attest to his versatile presence. He has twice been recognized with honors at the Pleiades Art Gallery in Chelsea, New York, and the Wilmer Jennings Gallery at Kenkeleba. Deeply influenced by the spiritual, historical, and cultural memory of Haiti, Cadet's art reflects on resilience, displacement, and the endurance of humanity. Currently based in New Jersey, Cadet continues to expand his practice internationally, with works held in private collections and museums. His biography accompanies his entry in Monochromica magazine and online gallery, affirming his role as a contemporary voice bridging Haitian heritage and global artistic discourse.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

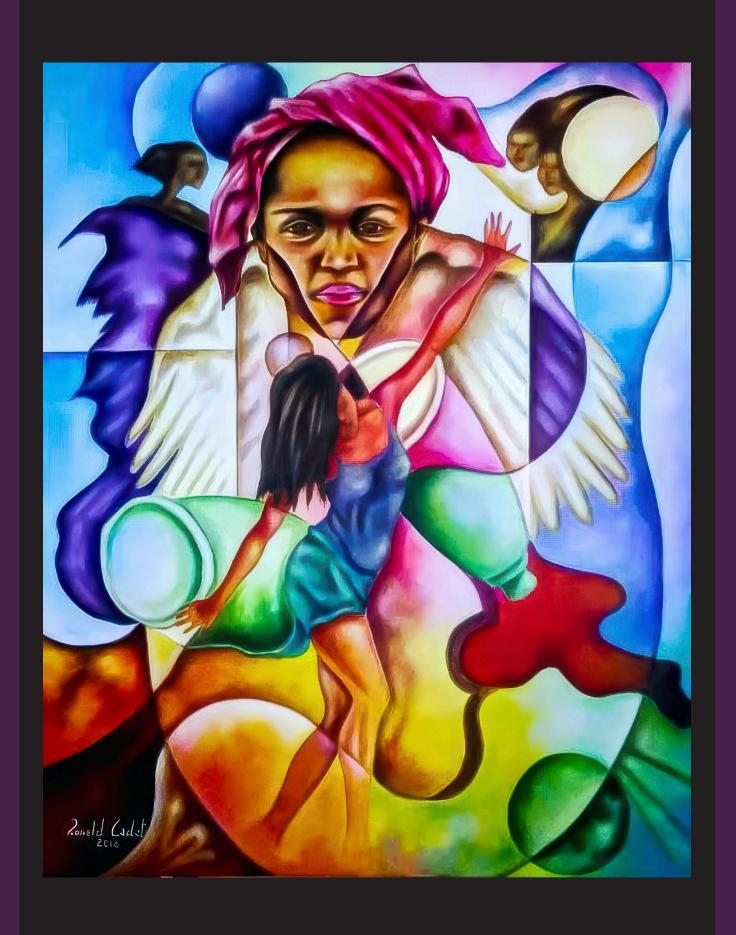
Artist's Statement - Ronald Cadet Art, for me, is both testimony and survival. Born in Haiti, I carry within my work the rhythm of ancestral memory, the turbulence of history, and the resilience of the human spirit. My training at the National Arts School in Port-au-Prince (2001–2006), the Universidad Autónoma de Santo Domingo (2008–2010), and the Art Center of Léopold Sédar Senghor in Dakar (2010-2011) shaped my practice across painting, sculpture, graphics, ceramics, and fiberglass techniques, allowing me to weave tradition with contemporary experimentation. My inspirations emerge from contrasts, anguish and hope, fragmentation and rebirth, silence and testimony. I often draw from the spiritual depth of Haitian culture, the strength of the African diaspora, and the lived experiences of exile, struggle, and survival. Color and form are never neutral in my work; they carry symbolic weight, embodying both wounds and healing. In paintings such as Fight to Survive, created during the New York lockdown, I sought not only to document the crisis but to reveal the resilience of humanity under siege. Whether through canvas or sculpture, I intend to create spaces where viewers confront memory and possibility, both personal and collective. My art has traveled from Haiti to Greece, Luxembourg, New York, and New Jersey, reminding me that creation is a bridge between cultures and a universal language of reflection. Ultimately, I see art as philosophy in motion: a dialogue with time, history, and the fragile endurance of the human spirit. 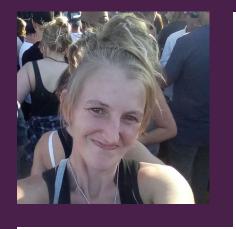


Detail from "Ma Demoiselle" Acrylic on Canvas, 16in x 20in x 2in, 2016, \$1999.99

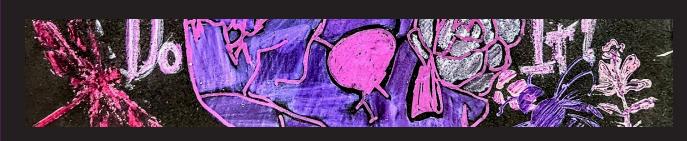

Arian aka HYPNOTIQ is a multidisciplinary artist and sculptor known for transforming raw materials into immersive, emotionally charged artworks that blur the line between sculpture, painting, and installation. Based in Seattle, Arian's practice combines elements of pop art, industrial design, and spiritual symbolism—resulting in bold 3D wall sculptures, light-based installations, and textural mixed media pieces that are as hypnotic as they are thought-provoking. Each piece begins with an unconventional mix of materials—metal mesh, plaster, plexiglass, wood, resin, and acrylics—layered, sculpted, and finished with high-gloss coatings and custom framing. Arian draws inspiration from natural forces, emotional extremes, and the contrast between control and chaos. The work often reflects themes of transformation, resilience, and inner power—presented through vibrant color gradients, cracked textures, and futuristic finishes. Exhibited internationally and at major art fairs including

Art Basel Miami, New York, and San Francisco, Arian's work has been collected by global icons such as Steve Aoki and Boris Brejcha. HYPNOTIQ pieces have also been featured in fashion shows, music performances, and gallery spaces worldwide—from Ecuador to Australia. Whether creating glow-in-the-dark murals, smart-tech sculptures, or resin-soaked wall pieces, Arian brings a unique fusion of art, technology, and energy into every creation. Arian aka HYPNOTIQ is not just creating art—they're building experiences meant to shift perception, stir emotion, and leave a lasting imprint. Every work invites the viewer to pause, reflect, and step into a new kind of visual rhythm—where modern art becomes a mirror, a pulse, and a story all at once.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

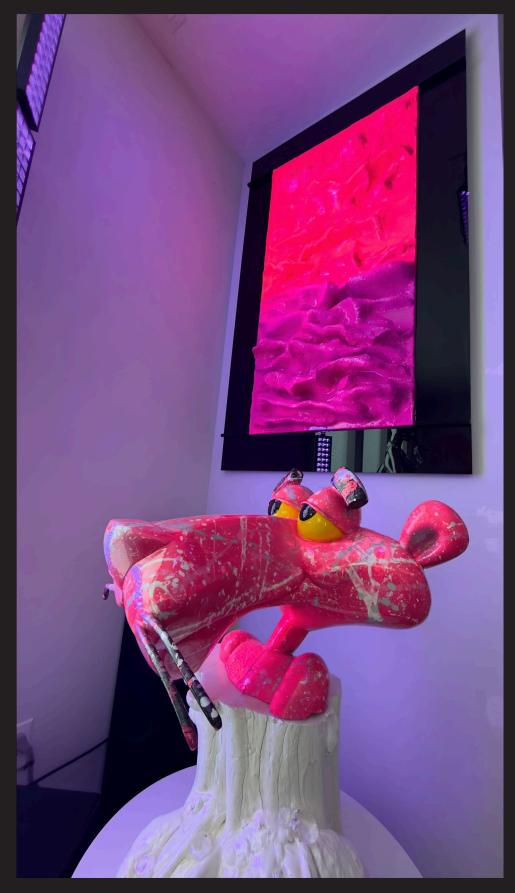
My work is an exploration of texture, emotion, and light—sculpted into wave-like motion using unexpected materials. This 3D wall art piece is constructed from layers of metal mesh, hand-shaped plaster, wood, and clear plexiglass, then airbrushed with gradients of hot pink and deep violet from opposing directions. The result evokes the rhythmic push and pull of ocean waves—both peaceful and chaotic—frozen in time. I use color as a psychological tool, blending high-energy magenta tones with darker purples to reflect the duality of power and serenity. The final piece is coated in a thick layer of high-gloss resin that magnifies the cracked, almost geological texture beneath. It is framed in heavy black plexiglass to contrast and contain the organic chaos within—a modern relic encased in clean, futuristic lines. My inspiration comes from nature's raw forces, filtered through a pop art lens. I want viewers to feel like they're standing at the edge of something alive—a moment caught mid-surge. This piece speaks to transformation, resilience, and how beauty often emerges through distortion and imbalance. It challenges the idea that fine art must sit still; instead, it pulses, reflects, and reacts to light and perspective. My practice blends sculpture, painting, and industrial design. Each layer is intentional, each material chosen to stretch the boundary between painting and installation. Through this fusion, I aim to hypnotize the viewer into staying present—just long enough to feel something real.

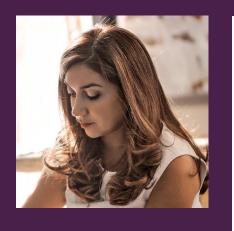


Detail from "See-through dancing Venus" Mixed media: plexiglass, acrylic, resin, 42in x 24in x 24in, 2022, \$7500

MARYAM MOHI



BIOGRAPHY

Maryam Mohi is an Iranian-American multidisciplinary artist based in the United States. Her work is grounded in painting, using acrylic, resin, and watercolor to explore layered narratives that touch on memory, identity, and transformation. Drawing from both cultural heritage and personal experience, she combines traditional methods with experimental textures to create emotionally resonant, visually tactile compositions. After more than a decade in corporate leadership and project management, Maryam made the intentional shift to a full-time art practice in 2025. This transition marked a return to her earliest passion—visual art. Her paintings have been exhibited in galleries and art centers across Texas and Iran, including The Other Art Fair, the Irving Art Center, and Blue House Too Gallery

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

From a young age, I was drawn to art. I took classes in painting and creative expression during my childhood, experimenting with watercolor, acrylic, and different surfaces. Despite this early passion, I never pursued a formal academic degree in art. Instead, I followed a more traditional path, completing advanced degrees in business and computer networks. For many years, art remained in the background-something I loved but did not see as a professional path. Eventually, I realized that returning to art was not optional but necessary. After years of higher education and work outside the arts, I chose to reconnect with my main passion and dedicate myself to being a fulltime artist. My practice is rooted in painting but not defined by rigid boundaries. I work across watercolor, acrylic, resin, and mixed media, layering them on paper, canvas, wood, and fabric. These materials carry their own texture and history, allowing me to build depth over time. Each piece is an exploration: I start without a fixed plan, letting memory, mood, and material guide the process. Layers of color and mark-making accumulate until the work feels balanced and authentic. This approach reflects my own lived experience. Being Iranian-American and navigating different cultural and professional spaces has given me an appreciation for duality and transformation. In my paintings, acrylic might merge into resin, or abstract gestures might meet fragments that feel symbolic. These overlaps mirror how identity and experience combine in meaningful ways. Art for me is both reflection and communication. It gives me space to pause and process, while also allowing me to share that space with others. I want my work to invite presence—to encourage viewers to slow down, look closely, and connect in their own way. Rather than prescribing meaning, I aim to create surfaces where personal and collective experiences can meet.

I collect plastic waste - COVID tests, broken earphones, produce nets from grocery stores, interweaving them into knit textile art. I remix waste as playful installations to unpack the illusion of value in this time of mass consumption, waste, and individualism, challenging others and myself to sculpt unique art that tells stories with the human traces left in "trash".

PAT FLANAGAN



BIOGRAPHY

I am a digital artist who lives in Lynnwood, WA. I've been active in digital art since the mid 1980s, all self-taught. Born in 1967, I grew up through the musical revolutions of punk, electronic music, and new wave. Each disruptive of the prior, each a rejection of the past. The music I grew up with strongly shaped my artistic viewpoint. While I'm primarily interested in blending real and surreal to create fantasy and pop art, I also enjoy the challenge of exploring varying styles. Until recently, my art has been for my own enjoyment, as well as commercial graphic design for clients. The recent publication of nine of my artworks alongside those of 14 other artists, including Boy George, Mark Wardel (TradeMark), and Suzi Quatro, in the book "Reflections In Rhyme" prompted me to open my archive and create new works for the public. This led to my art appearing in 2023 juried exhibitions in London; Fort Collins, CO;

Everett, WA; Madison, WI; Niceville, FL; and Laguna Beach, CA, plus three large pieces juried into the Edmonds Art Festival in Edmonds, WA in 2024.

ARTISTIC STATEMENT

"Disruption. I believe art should disrupt, disturb, evoke, provoke, and even polarize." I embrace and employ all manner of digital art techniques and applications, from simple hand-drawing through to Al generation. I believe that no methods are off the table, though I like to take the results of those methods and manipulate them by hand to fit my artistic vision. For my digital collage portraits, I typically start with a photograph of the face. In Photoshop, I manually manipulate and change the face, while painting over it to transform it into a unique work. I then blend a mix of elements, including real world, hand-drawn, and Al-generated, all manipulated and painted as the face was, to create my finished digital collages. Thus, even automatically generated elements are turned collaborative, resulting in truly human-made art.

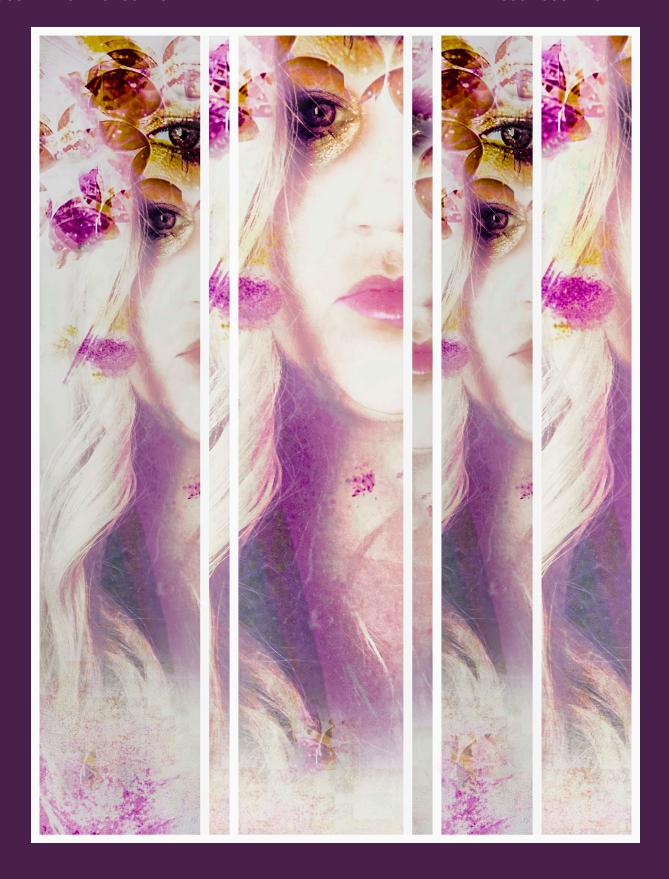
